- 4. Course Policies: (All rules outlined in the student handbook are adhered to.)
 - a. Attendance/absences/tardies I follow the student handbook strictly.
 - b. Make-up work/late work I follow the student handbook strictly.
- 5. Classroom rules
 - i. Students will be assigned a seat. Do not leave this seat unless you have raised your hand and received permission.
 - ii. Students are to be in seats when the bell rings, prepared with class materials, and ready to go.
 - iii. Participation is required! Languages are INTERACTIVE. Encourage and use Spanish as the main means of communication at all times.
 - iv. Do not use Spanish-English Internet translators. This action will result in an automatic zero for the assignment and a possible referral to the Academic Integrity Committee.
 - v. Late work will not be accepted for credit.
 - vi. Raise hand for recognition before speaking.
 - vii. Approach me immediately with any concerns.
 - viii. Passes to leave the room are only given for emergency situations.
 - ix. No cell phone use in classroom.
- 6. Grading Policies:
 - a. Grading scale is compliant with district standard.
 - b. Grades are earned according to overall performance in class.
 - c. We will have in-class and homework assignments, various tests that include listening, projects, presentations, and compositions.

d. In addition to teacher created assessments I also use assessment materials provided by the district.

e. You will receive interims and grade cards. I will post grades in the classroom by student id number. f. Parents may email me at any time for an updated grade. g. Grades are calculated using 25% for in-class and homework completion type work and 75% for teacher assessed work.

7. Departmental Policy:

This is course is conducted over the course of two semesters. Students must earn a grade of C- or better both semesters to progress to the next level of Spanish. Failure to earn a sufficient grade either semester will result in a student having to repeat the course.

8. Course Procedures:

a. We cover 2-3 chapters per quarter.

b. Generally the chapters begin with a story that we watch and listen to on DVD. The story is centered on the vocabulary and structures presented in the chapter.

- c. New concepts and vocabulary are introduced, followed by practice—some individual, some paired, some grouped.
- d. I expect students to complete workbook and text assignments. I RECOMMEND 20-30 MINUTES OF REVIEW PER NIGHT REGARDLESS OF HAVING HOMEWORK OR NOT.
- e. Quizzes are given on a weekly basis. Sometimes, tests are given at the end of each chapter.
- 9. Personal Statement -

Second language acquisition should be a very rewarding experience for the student. It does entail hard work and commitment both inside and outside of the classroom. I expect students to work on a consistent basis to improve their listening, reading, speaking and writing skills in Spanish. If a student is struggling with the content, he/she is expected to seek extra help. This needs to be done immediately, as language acquisition is a building process. We constantly build and improve upon previously learned material.
